JAPAN COAST GUARD ISSUES SALVAGE

ALERT FOR SOUTH CHINA SEA DAYS AFTER U.S. NAVY F-35 CRASH

he Japan Coast Guard issued a maritime navigational alert for salvage operations in the South China Sea over the weekend, indicating the U.S. Navy may be starting its effort to recover a stealth fighter that sank in the ocean last week

An F-35C Lightning II crashed on Jan. 24 while attempting to land on aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson. The U.S. 7th Fleet plans to salvage the aircraft, it said last week.

Saturday's navigational alert, issued by the coast guard's Hydrographic and Oceanographic Department, specifies that salvage operations are taking place "until further notice" approximately 300 miles northeast of the Paracel Islands and 170 miles off the western coast of the Philippines.

However, 7th Fleet spokeswoman Cmdr. Haylev Sims would not comment on whether the navigational alert was related to the Navy's salvage plans.

"The U.S. Navy is making recovery operations arrangements for the F-35C aircraft involved in the crash aboard USS Carl Vinson in the South China Sea," she said Tuesday by phone.

The Navy will attempt to recover the aircraft while keeping safety and national security interests in mind, Pentagon press secretary John F. Kirby said Jan. 27.

"We're certainly mindful

of the value of an F-35 in every respect of what value means," he said at a media briefing.

The "C" variant of the fifth-generation fighter is configured for carrier landings and costs approximately \$103 million per aircraft, according to manufacturer Lockheed Martin, but its value also includes classified technology

The aircraft crashed into

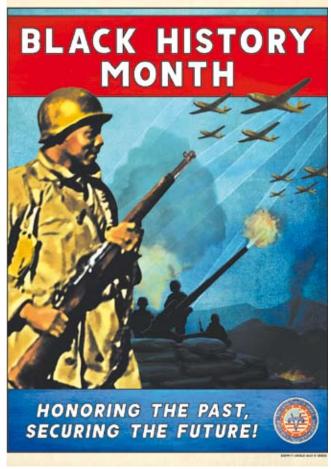
the deck of Carl Vinson during a landing attempt, then fell into the water, the Navy said last week. The pilot ejected and was picked up by a rescue helicopter, and six other sailors were injured in the crash.

Three were flown to a hospital in Manila, the Philippines; the remaining four were treated aboard Carl

Sims said the three Sailors

who were hospitalized have since been released. She said the incident is under investigation and no further details are available.

DOD, nation celebrate Black History Month

Black History Month, also known as National African American History Month, is an annual celebration of achievements by Black Americans and a time to recognize the positive impact they've had on the history of the United States and the Defense Department. Black people have fought in every United States war, from the Revolutionary War through the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. Ninety African Americans have been awarded the Medal of Honor. Yet, throughout most of American history, Black service members were placed in segregated units. Desegregation didn't occur until Jan. 26, 1948, when President Harry S. Truman issued Executive Order 9981 directing the armed services to integrate. Activeduty service members number 1,319,283; of those, 227,974, or 17.3%, are African American, as of December 2021.

U.S., in lockstep with NATO allies, calls on Putin to stand down

The United States is in lockstep with NATO allies in calling for Russian President Vladimir Putin to de-escalate his country's situation with Ukraine, U.S. defense leaders said during a Pentagon news conference Jan. 28.

Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III stressed that conflict with Russia isn't inevitable

"There is still time and space for diplomacy," the secretary told Pentagon reporters. "The United States, in lockstep with our allies and partners, has offered Russia a path away from crisis and toward greater security, and the Department of Defense will continue to support those diplomatic efforts.

Both Austin and Milley said the 8,500 U.S. troops have not been ordered to go anywhere, yet. The troops will be part of the NATO Response Force if that unit is activated.

The Ukrainian military has about 150,000 active-duty troops and a larger number of reservists, Milley said.

Ukraine is a NATO partner, not a NATO member, but NATO leaders have told Putin that any incursion into Ukraine would trigger significant economic and diplomatic costs. "A move on Ukraine will accomplish the very thing Russia says it does not want: a NATO alliance strengthened and resolved on its

will suffer immensely," the western flank," Austin said.

"The United States will contribute to NATO's response forces. And we will coordinate with our NATO allies. We will make sure that they have the capabilities that they need to defend themselves. Article Five is clear on its point of attack against one NATO member is an attack against us all. And as President Biden has said, the United States holds this as a sacred obligation. And we will do right by that commitment."

Austin and Milley said that

while they do not believe Putin has made the decision to use the troops amassed on Ukraine's border, he clearly has that capability. The frontline states of NATO are, understandably, worried about Russian aggression. NATO has significant military capability, Milley said. NATO has more than 130 brigades of maneuver forces, not including U.S. forces, the chairman said. The alliance also has 93 squadrons of high-end fighters, four aircraft carriers, and many more surface combatants. "The military capability of NATO is very, very significant," he said.

TOKYO - Military exercises between the United States and its allies in the Western Pacific, both ongoing and upcoming, send a message to China not to pull a "stunt" to distract people at home, according to a New Zealand-based American security expert.

The Air Force is about to launch Cope North, a large-scale aerial combat, force employment and disaster relief exercise with Japan and Australia, that will involve more than 2,000 sorties on and around Guam, Pacific Air Forces announced in a statement

Fighter aircraft from all three nations will take part in counter-air and close-air support missions, according to the statement. They'll also practice aerial refueling. Counter air means attacking enemy air bases while close air support involves aircraft attacking enemy targets near friendly ground forces.

"These training missions will conclude with a large force employment exercise designed to enhance readiness and interoper-

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ability among the three countries," the statement said.

Interoperability describes the ability of one country's armed forces to use another country's training methods and military

The drills follow last week's Keen Edge command post exercise involving U.S. and Japanese forces in Japan and the ongoing Marine Exercise 2022 amphibious-assault training involving U.S. Sailors and Marines and local forces in the Philippines.

The exercises send a message to China, New Zealand-based security expert Paul Buchanan said Monday.

Internal troubles such as economic and supply disruptions and coronavirus outbreaks could turn powerful Chinese factions against President Xi Jinping, Buchanan predicted.

The Chinese leader hasn't left Beijing for 700 days, Foreign Policy reported Friday.

'What do authoritarian leaders do when they are concerned about internal challenges?" Buchanan asked. "They do something outside to distract attention?

The U.S. and its allies are eager to deter China from "pulling a stunt" in the South China Sea or beyond, he said

"The possibility of Xi intentionally ... using conflict to divert attention from his internal woes have increased dramatically" he said. "These exercises increase deterrence.'

The Cope North exercise, which runs from Wednesday to Feb. 18, begins with humanitarian-assistance and disaster-relief training, according to a Pacific Air Forces statement.

Training will take place at Andersen Air Force Base and Northwest Field on Guam; the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, including Rota, Saipan and Tinian; Palau and the Federated States of Micronesia, the statement said.

Over 2,000 sorties are planned across seven islands and 10 airfields. More than 2,500 U.S. airmen, Marines, and Sailors will

train alongside about 1,000 from Japan and Australia. Approximately 130 aircraft from over 30 units will fly in the exercise, the statement said.

The training begins as drills in Japan and the Philippines end.

U.S. Sailors and Marines and Philippine troops wrapped up Marine Exercise 2022 in the Philippines Wednesday.

The forces, which began training Thursday, have involved warships training at sea, the U.S. Embassy in the Philippines said on its website Friday.

The training includes beach landings, search and seizure of enemy craft and moving troops and equipment, the statement

U.S. warships participating include USS Essex, USS Portland and USS Pearl Harbor carrying troops from the 11th MEU.

Keen Edge, which began Jan. 23 and wraps up Thursday, involves 500 U.S. personnel and 1,380 Japanese troops at Yokota Air Base and other locations in Japan, along with Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii. It aims to increase combat readiness and the ability of U.S. and Japanese Forces to work together, USFJ said in a Jan. 23 statement.

Multi-capable Airmen train with Marine Corps

DAVIS-MONTHAN AIR FORCE BASE, Ariz. - Multi-capable Airmen training has expanded to Twentynine Palms, Calif., with a new opportunity to train alongside the Marine Corps in an operationally limited environment.

The joint training with the Marine Wing Support Squadron 374 was developed by the 357th Fighter Squadron and 79th Rescue Squadron to provide hands-on training at the largest Marine Corps base.

"Once a quarter, we are providing an opportunity for as many as 15 multi-capable Airmen to go on this mission and practice forward area refueling point operations and airfield security,"

said Air Force Lt. Col. Joel Bier, 357th FS commander. "We keep evolving this joint force training to have MCA accomplish mission objectives in an expeditionary environment."

So far, this training has been conducted in October and December 2021, with trained MCA flying out on 79th RQS HC-130J Combat King II aircraft. At Twentynine Palms, MCA get the unique opportunity to work alongside Marines to secure the landing zone for 357th FS A-10C Thunderbolt IIs and install the AM-2 airfield mat for the A-10s to land on.

"We were able to learn similarities between (the branches) operational concepts," said Marine Corps Chief Warrant Officer 2 Matthew Wilson, Marine Wing Support Squadron 374 airfield services officer. "Which will inform our current and future planners about the capabilities, skills and technical abilities of similar military occupation specialty types outside of the Marine Corps."

Working alongside the Marine Corps' airfield services officers and bulk fuel specialists, the 355th Wing's MCA refine their skill set of conducting FARP operations and ensuring A-10s take off and land safely in austere locations.

"Overall I would say that we enjoy working with the Air Force during all types of training operations," Wilson said. "I know for a fact that the Marines always enjoy seeing an A-10 in the pattern."

Department of the Navy provides technical report and dataset in support of report to Congress

WASHINGTON - The Department of the Navy submitted its report on real-time aircraft sound monitoring at two Navy west coast air stations to Congress on Dec. 1 in accordance with the Fiscal Year 2020 and 2021 National Defense Authorization Acts.

Navy is now releasing a sup-

porting technical report and associated dataset as indicated in the report to Congress.

The report provides greater detail regarding the study's design, data collection and analysis procedures, and results. It provides background information regarding the basics of sound and Department of Defense aircraft noise models and noise study procedures.

The associated dataset includes the raw sound level meter data, observer logs and operational data collected during the monitoring periods. It also includes data produced for our analysis including sound level calculations and noise modeling files as well as other noise modeling input/output files associated with the study.

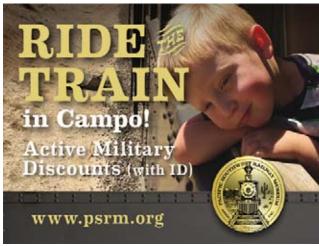
The four men, all in their 20s, face vandalism charges in Jan. 29, mishap on the Skyfari Aerial Tram.

The Marine Corps is moving toward increasing the use of electric vehicles to help reduce emissions and make the service more environmentally friendly, while simultaneously strengthening operational capabilities.

As part of that move, Marine Corps Installations West's South West Region Fleet Transportation office recently received Beam solar-powered electric vehicle chargers to test for use with their fleet of government vehicles aboard several installations.

The SWRFT office, who is responsible for overseeing and providing transportation support to all Marine Corps installations in the Southwest, is installing two of the chargers on Camp Pendleton.

An initiative underscoring the Marine Corps' commitment to a more energy resilient force, the Beam system is a self-contained, portable solar-powered panel designed to fit over a parking spot while also leaving space for a vehicle to park underneath it. While there are already permanent EV charging stations on Camp Pendleton to charge electric vehicles, the unique capability of Beam chargers is they are independent from the grid and can be installed immediately

These units can also be moved as needed to support mission essential tasks or be used during emergencies as a power bank, thus increasing the overall capabilities of the user.

"This unit is unique in the way that we'll be able to transport it and move wherever we see fit." said Steve DeLaTorre, the transportation operations manager for SWRFT. "It's self contained and charged by the sun. It has batteries as well.'

One of the units has already been installed, and SWRFT is in the process of determining where to place the remaining

"Being renewable, not tied to the grid, gives us a lot of flexibility", said Samuel Seaman, the regional fleet manager for SWRFT. "That's very important when you're trying to support vehicles, so they'll give us a capability that we didn't have before.'

Expeditionary in nature, a single unit can charge up to four vehicles at a time, with each one

including an emergency box with multiple outlets for use by first responders in case of a power outage.

"If there should be an outage somewhere we could use that to get power until the battery is depleted," said Seaman.

Currently there are two Beam chargers on the installation, but SWRFT will acquire more in the future if the system meets the region's needs. Either way, SWRFT will continue exploring ways to provide greener options for the region's fleet transportation needs

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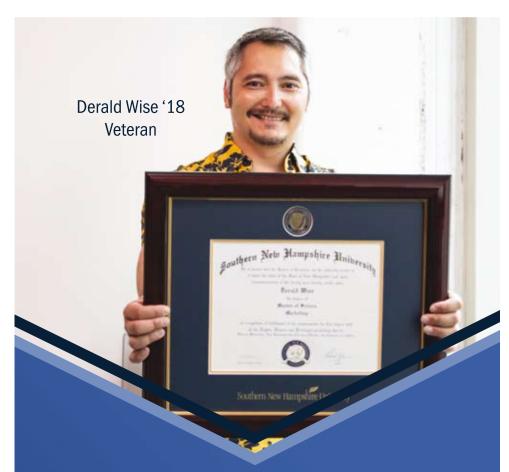

Fleet rating experts needed for exam development

PENSACOLA, Fla. (Jan. 28, 2022) - Released Jan. 25, Naval Administrative Message (NA-VADMIN) 011/22 announced the Advancement Examination Readiness Review (AERR) schedule for April through September 2022.

Navy chief petty officers (E-7 to E-9) are needed to serve as rating fleet subject matter experts (FSMEs) for upcoming AERRs which are held in Pensacola, Florida. FSMEs provide their expertise by updating and validating the Navy-wide advancement exam question bank for their respective ratings.

Navy chief petty officers on active duty, full time support, and Reservists on active duty for special work are encouraged to take part in the process by reaching out to their Type Commander (TYCOM) or rating sponsor point of contact (POC) for application information.

"Type Commanders and rating sponsors select AERR members to cover each rating's unique job requirements," said Naval Education and Training Professional Development Center (NETPDC) Command Master Chief Gregory Prichard. "The AERR selection process ensures all platforms, skills and rating work are represented. Having the right mix of rating experts is key to determining appropriate exam content for upcoming administrations."

AERRs are an integral part of the advancement system and are not only beneficial to the fleet SMEs who attend, but the Navy as a whole.

"We use this opportunity as a tool to tailor the material towards topics Sailors should know and keep the information current,†said Chief Yeoman (Submarine) Nicole Arnold. "By doing so we are creating a strong, fighting fleet and testing the knowledge of our future leaders."

Arnold, who attended the Yeoman (Submarine) AERR in August, said the experience was rewarding.

"Without a doubt, my time at the AERR has made a direct impact on future yeomen," said Arnold. "We have reinvigorated this rating exam to shape the submarine force and produce excellent leading yeomen."

AERRs vary in length between one to two weeks and are held throughout the year, with each specific rating reviewed on average once a year. AERR participants receive temporary duty orders from their parent command, paid for by NETPDC. Normally, four to six nominees are selected to be panel members

for each AERR.

The April through September 2022 schedule is now available. To view the annual AERR schedule, locate a specific rating point of contact, or view AERR eligibility requirements, log into My Navy Portal, www. mnp.navy.mil, and search under Professional Resources/Navy Advancement Center/AERR. Contact the TYCOM or rating sponsor POC to determine submission deadlines.

Once selected, chiefs receive a selection e-mail from the Navy Advancement Center (NAC) approximately 45 days prior to the start of the AERR. Selectees should make early contact with NAC staff to answer any questions they may have concerning the AERR process.

As part of the MyNavy HR Force Development team, NETPDC provides products and services that enable and enhance education, training, career development, and personnel advancement throughout the Navy. Primary elements of the command include the Voluntary Education Department, the NAC, and the Resources Management Department.

WWII Navy veteran and Kansas City native visits USS Kansas City

NAVAL BASE SAN DIEGO Navy Quartermaster 2nd Class (Ret.) Norman Williams visited USS Kansas City littoral combat ship during a scheduled visit

Williams, a native of Kansas City, served on board hospital ship USS Relief (AH-1) during WWII from 1944 to 1946.

"It's an honor to have him here with us, especially being a veteran who hails from our namesake Kansas City" said Cmdr. Wayne Gehman, Kansas City commanding officer "Veteran Sailors like Williams exemplify the importance of recognizing our history as a service and how far we have come.

Kansas City was built in Mobile, Ala., by Austal USA. The ship was commissioned June 20, 2020, before being assigned to Littoral Combat Ship Squadron ONE (COMLCSRON ONE) in San Diego.

"The Navy has made a lot of advancements since my time in," said Williams. "I'm impressed by the equipment and the people running it, and it's been great getting to see how far we've

During Williams's time serving aboard Relief, the crew aided and transported casualties throughout the war, mainly from Okinawa and Guam. Afterwards, Relief was stationed in the Philippines in preparation for the invasion of the Japanese mainland.

112 reps request briefing on NPRC's plan to reduce vets request backlog

Rep. Mike Bost (Ill.), the ranking member of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee, Rep. Cliff Bentz (Or.), and Rep. Fred Keller (Pa.) released a statement after joining over 100

of their colleagues in sending a letter to the Director of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) calling for the National Personnel Records Center to report to Congress on their plan to reduce the backlog of vets' record requests.

"Repeatedly I have been calling for the White House to develop a plan to fully staff the NPRC to chip away at the backlog of veterans' record requests," said Bost. "While I'm encouraged that the NPRC has made strides since this time last year for records requests originating from VA, veterans are still waiting weeks to months on end for their own records requests."

The NPRC hasn't maintained full capacity, in-person, employment (only 25 percent) since March 2020. Since then, many vets haven't received records they need to demonstrate their military service and verify their service-connected conditions.

As a result, these individuals can't receive the medical care. disability compensation, and retirement pay they have earned. In some instances, the NPRC is the only agency that can provide veterans with these records.

In a flash of clarity, I realized that Francis was right: He couldn't pop popcorn, and it was all my fault. Our yellow lab Moby looked up at me and licked his chops over his unexpected good fortune.

Later, in our respective spots on the couch, Francis and I munched the second batch I'd popped for us after cleaning up the mess. Sensing that something significant had dawned on me as a result of the incident, Francis offered, "I'll pop it the right way for you next time.

I smiled, relieved that Francis understood - I had always needed

Did you know that dropping just 10 pounds of body weight takes 40 pounds of pressure off your knees? That's equivalent to not carrying around a cinder block.

Losing even a little weight now can have a major impact on your health and quality of life. This long list of benefits might help motivate you to adjust your habits to achieve a happier, healthier lifestyle.

Reduce Blood Pressure

Eating more nutritious foods and drinking more water can reduce high blood pressure, and its risk of stroke and heart attack. Nearly half of service members diagnosed as overweight or obese are also diagnosed with hypertension, Defense Health Agency data shows.

Reduce Joint & Back Pain

Carrying less body weight will reduce stress on your entire body. DHA data shows that one in five overweight service members reports lower back pain.

Women's Health

Obesity can also have significant consequences for women's reproductive systems, including menstrual disorders, infertility, miscarriage, and poor pregnancy outcomes. If you plan to get pregnant, now's the time to shed some

Better Sleep

The more weight you lose, the less likely you are to snore or have sleep apnea, where your breathing actually stops for short periods of time throughout the night. You might even get to stop using your C-PAP device.

DHA data finds that 1 in 4 service members who are overweight share a diagnosis of sleep disorder like apnea and snoring.

The result of better sleep? You're less fatigued, have more energy, and a happier bedroom

Reduced Risk of Diabetes

Another bonus of losing weight? Your chances of developing prediabetes or full-blown type 2 diabetes drop significantly as your blood sugars drop.

As you take more control of your weight, you may see a decrease in symptoms of depression and an improvement in self-image.

So get started. Talk to a nutritionist, dietitian, or physical trainer about getting your weight loss plan in place. In the long run,

weight lowers your risk of serious chronic diseases. Now's the best time to start.

Pro Tip: Drink More Water

What should be your first step and how quickly can that help you? The answer is as simple as drinking more water.

Drinking water throughout the day fills you up, lubricates your ioints, improves your skin, eliminates toxins faster, and helps with digestion. No more acid reflux. also known as GERD, or eating handfuls of antacids like candy!

Start carrying water with you at all times and sip it until you need a refill. Then do it all again.

Making this one change can help with joint pain which comes with being overweight, as well as reducing arthritis symptoms.

Pro Tip: Start Small

The best advice from nutritionists is to start small and then make more changes as your health improves.

Start with a specific, measurable goal that is achievable within a short period of time. That will make it relevant to you.

For example, try to lose 5% of your body weight, dropping 1 or 2 pounds a week. For a 230-pound man, that's about 11-1/2 pounds.



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
