3RD M.A.W., EXPEDITIONARY STRIKE GROUP 3

DEMONSTRATE F-35B LIGHTNING II JETS CARRIER CONCEPT

NAVAL BASE SAN DI-EGO - The Navy and Marine Corps demonstrated a key capability when they operated 20 F-35B Lightning II jets from amphibious assault carrier USS Tripoli March 30 through April 8, fully exercising the Marine Corps' "lightning carrier" concept for the first time in naval history on an amphibious assault ship.

Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. David H. Berger spoke to the potential of the "lighting carrier" concept based on amphibious assault ships in his planning guidance. "Lightning" is derived from the predominance of F-35B Lightning II aircraft aboard.

The demonstration featured 16 iets from Marine Aircraft Group (MAG) 13, 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing, with an additional four from Marine Operational Test and Evaluation Squadron 1, all operating from Tripoli at a high tempo. The Navy and Marine Corps team has incrementally developed the Lightning carrier concept and continues to refine its tactics, techniques, and procedures to support integrated naval operations.

"When this opportunity came up to put this many of our fifth generation aircraft on board

Tripoli in conjunction with operational testing, we were thrilled," said Col. Chad Vaughn, commanding officer of MAG-13. "It has been an incredible opportunity to train to fight as a MAG from the sea, to train our pilots, and to work alongside our Navy teammates.'

The demonstration proved that an assault carrier can be a lethal addition and provides combatant commanders with more options when employed in creative ways. An earlier concept utilized amphibious assault ships to demonstrate the "Harrier carrier" concept for **AV-8B** Harriers

This concept will not change the standard make-up of an amphibious ready group and Marine expeditionary unit (ARG/MEU). However, the exercise demonstrated the potential to utilize amphibious assault ships to provide the naval and joint force with lethal access, collection, and strike capabilities from fifth generation Short Takeoff/Vertical Landing (STO/VL) aircraft in future operations.

"This demonstration proved the versatility of the Americaclass assault carrier, with its ability to embark either two squadrons of F-35Bs and a MAG command element, or a battalion-sized landing force and the associated assault support [12 MV-22B Ospreys, four CH-53E Super Stallions, and six F-35B Lightning II]," said Navy Capt. Joel Lang, Tripoli's commanding officer. "For the fleet commander, both options are formidable and sustainable."

Tripoli, an amphibious assault

"The fifth-generation capability of the F-35B brings a significant advancement in capability to the combatant commanders.

Navy carrier strike group steams off Korean Peninsula amid talk of North Korean test

CAMP HUMPHREYS, South Korea - USS Abraham Lincoln and its strike group are operating with Japanese forces near the Korean Peninsula amid speculation that North Korea will conduct another weapons test.

The carrier group was conducting "routine bilateral operations" with Japan's Maritime Self-Defense Force in the East Sea, also known as the Sea of Japan, according to an e-mail from the 7th Fleet to Stars and Stripes on April 12.

'Our training enhances the credibility of conventional deterrence by demonstrating the strength of our bilateral partnerships," wrote 7th Fleet spokesman Lt. Mark Langford. Operations like this "reassure our allies and partners of the U.S. commitment to maintaining a free and open Indo-Pacific," he said.

Langford, citing security concerns, declined to say how long Abraham Lincoln and its strike group will be in the region. South Korea's Yonhap

News Agency, which first reported on the operation, reported Tuesday that the group will be in the area for three to five days

U.S. Forces Korea, the command responsible for roughly 28,500 troops, also cited security concerns and declined to comment on upcoming military operations on April 11.

A South Korean official told Stars and Stripes on Tuesday that the military has been "maintaining close cooperation in the deployment of strategic U.S. assets" and directed questions to the U.S. Defense Department.

The operation marks the first time since 2017 that a U.S. carrier group has deployed to the East Sea. At the time, USS Ronald Reagan, USS Theodore Roosevelt and USS Nimitz sailed together with their naval counterparts from South Korean and Japan for an exercise off the peninsula's coast.

North Korea's Foreign Ministry threatened to retaliate against the exercises in 2017, which it characterized as a preemptive move for a full-scale








"These are strategically important waters that warrant our attention," said Vice Adm. Brad Cooper, commander of a 34nation naval alliance known as Combined Maritime Forces

Yemen's Houthi militia recently attempted to attack oil tankers in the region with explosive-laden boats, the Saudi Arabian-based Arab News reported. Meanwhile, an Iran-backed militant group seized a United Arab Emirates-flagged cargo vessel in January, The Associated Press reported.

Iran and Israel also have accused each other of attacking each other's ships in the region's waterways over the last year.

The task force will begin its first mission Sunday in the Red Sea aboard USS Mount Whitney, the flagship of the Italy-headquartered U.S. 6th Fleet, which is currently operating with the

"Any destabilizing activity, including threats to commercial traffic and coastal infrastructure. really can have profound global impacts," said Cooper, who also helms U.S. Naval Forces Central Command and 5th Fleet.

About 10 percent of the world's shipping passes through the Suez Canal connecting the Mediterranean and Red seas, a New York Times report said last year.

About 15 people will staff the task force, which will coordinate among two to eight coalition ships on any given day, Cooper

The ranks of CTF 153 are expected to be filled mostly by U.S. personnel at first, with staff from other partnered countries to join in the coming days, 5th Fleet spokesman Cmdr. Tim Hawkins said.

An unnamed regional partner is expected to assume the leadership role later this year, said

The new task force joins three existing ones in the Combined Maritime Forces. It will take over responsibilities previously held by Task Force 150, which will refocus on the Gulf of Oman and the North Arabian Sea, Cooper said.

The other two task forces focus on countering piracy and patrolling the seas around the Persian Gulf.

Some 9,000 weapons were seized by the U.S. 5th Fleet around the Middle East last year, mostly in the Gulf of Oman and

the Persian Gulf. The number is three times more than the previous year, Cooper said.

Austin lays out reasoning behind DOD budget request

At \$773 billion, the fiscal 2023 Defense Budget Request is huge, but that doesn't mean that painful choices are not necessary, defense leaders told



the Senate Armed Services Committee April 7.

Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III and Army Gen. Mark A. Milley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told the panel that with the change to strategic competition with China and Russia, that some of the capabilities resident in the Defense Department are no longer needed, or fewer of those capabilities are required.

The fiscal 2023 budget calls for the Army to discontinue modifications to older night vision systems and for medium tactical vehicle protection kits.

The Navy seeks to decommission some cruisers, littoral combat ships and dock landing ships. The Navy also looks to retire the RQ-21 unmanned reconnaissance aircraft.

The Air Force looks to divest some A-10s, the E-3 Sentry aircraft, the E-8 JSTARS aircraft,

some KC-135 refuelers and some C-130H aircraft.

The savings from cancelling, retiring or divesting these capabilities would allow the department to redirect resources to higher defense necessities, the secretary said. In fact, if this budget is approved, DOD would receive \$2.7 billion that it could reinvest in other, more pressing, systems.

Confronting powers like China and Russia means that the U.S. military must maximize "capability and capacity resident in every warfighting domain, air, land, space, sea and cyber, and that we're able to network those capabilities in new and different ways," Austin said.

DOD is investing in technologies and capabilities that will be needed in the future. The innovation and modernization accounts in DOD will receive \$130.1 billion if Congress approves the Defense Budget Request.

Milley said the cost benefit analysis to sustain these capabilities over time, "doesn't add up." He noted that many of the systems are old, and "we are trying to modernize the force for the future operating environment 2030 and beyond. And that's

what the investments are in this budget "

Austin and Milley were asked what effects the Russian invasion of Ukraine is having on the strategic picture in Europe. "This unlawful and unprovoked aggression by [Russian President Vladimir] Putin has had the effect of changing the security architecture in the region for some time to come," Austin said.

NATO defense officials are studying the outlook and positing the changes now, he said. The alliance is "taking a look at what has changed and what NATO will need to do, to make sure that we can continue to do what's necessary to $\hat{a} \in \$ defend our NATO countries," the secretary said. "That work is just commenced, it's ongoing. I expect that we'll have a robust discussion as we go to the summit in June."

Working out troop posture in the region requires some study. "As we look at that posture, we're going to look at capability in all five warfighting domains, and we're going to look at capability across NATO," Austin said. "We do expect that it will change our footprint. In terms of how much it changes, that remains to be seen."

Army Soldiers tour former top secret Soviet nuclear bunker

by 1st Lt. Lisabeth Quinn LIELVARDE AIR BASE, LATVIA - Philosopher George Santayana once said, "those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

In 2003, Latvia opened the doors to a former top secret Soviet nuclear bunker for public tours. During exercise Saber Strike 22, Soldiers assigned to the 1-3rd Attack "Viper" Battalion were able to take a tour of this preserved bunker and get a glimpse into how the Soviet military prepared for a possible nuclear attack.

"Today was a great opportunity to introduce Soldiers to Latvian Soviet history. Understanding this history and culture will deepen ties and foster relationships with Latvian NATO partners," said 1st Lt. Dean Lagattuta, Army intelligence officer, after touring the Soviet Bunker in Skajupes, Latvia.

A group of 45 Vipers and three Latvian soldiers from Lielvarde Air Base participated in the cultural tour. The tour explored the 40-year-old bunker concealed beneath the Ligatne Rehabilitation Centre and included stops in the main war room, communications room, map room, and planning room.

Soldiers saw the communications equipment, air purifiers, and original generators powered by Soviet built T-54 tank engines. Built to accommodate 250 people in the event of a chemical or nuclear attack, the Latvian government has preserved the majority of furniture and equipment in the bunker.

"In these tense working days, soldiers need to switch off their daily routine,"said Arnis Jagza, a crew chief with the aviation squadron of the Latvian Airforce. "Even a few hours outside of the base helped to do so. Today was a great day and I look forward to going on trips with you again."

Surface Force helps pregnant Sailors thrive through Artemis program

The Navy's Surface Force launched a program to help pregnant Sailors positively contribute to the Navy as they prepare for childbirth.

The Artemis program, named after the Greek goddess of the hunt and childbirth, welcomes pregnant Sailors from around the fleet and provides resources, mentorship, and professional development.

"Many women have to make difficult choices between their career and their family," said Yeoman 1st Class Treysean Bradburn, the leading petty officer of the Artemis Program. "The goal of this program is to provide Sailors with the support and skills that will allow them to continue their careers in the Navy."

The program's support ranges from professional skills training to counseling services while providing Sailors meaningful duties and time to maintain their physical fitness. Sailors in the program also have access to a strong support network of women Sailors who afford mentorship and guidance throughout

their pregnancy journey.

"The program's leaders are really supportive and knowledgeable with giving us information on the proper resources and making sure we're going to the right appointments," said Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Holly Richardson.

Boatswain's Mate Seaman Ashanti Cunningham echoed this sentiment.

"Being [in the program] is a huge stress reliever, especially with the Artemis team and the experience and mentorship they provide for Sailors," said Cunningham.

There's another added benefit to the Artemis program. The work that Sailors are doing while in the program is impacting their shipmates in the fleet. The program's participants are assisting Personnel Support Detachment San Diego (PSD) with maintaining records of personnel, military allowances, travel entitlements and deductions for the fleet.

"The support to PSD is providing an opportunity for Artemis Sailors to learn new skills and apply those skills directly to support the fleet in an area critical to the morale and wellbeing of every Sailor," said Senior Chief Aviation Boatswain's Mate Phillip Posada, the Artemis program senior enlisted leader. "They are making a meaningful impact on the fleet with their contributions."

Typically, Sailors remain in the Artemis Program for two years to give them time before and after pregnancy to adjust to their roles as mothers and to prepare them for their return to the fleet

"With this program, I have a support system while still doing my part for the Navy, and the program allows us to learn and make progress within our career," said Richardson. "I think it's important for women because it allows us to be moms while also preparing us to go back to the fleet."

With a strong support network that the Artemis program provides, Sailors are building resiliency that makes all the difference in their careers and personal lives.

"Being in the Navy while being pregnant is hard," said Cunningham, "but knowing you have other women beside you makes it easier. The program is very helpful and I encourage other Sailors to learn more about it."

Navy offering bonus of \$25K to all recruits who ship out by June

The Navy announced last Thursday that for the first time the service will offer an active-duty enlistment bonus of \$25,000 to anyone joining for any job in the service. However, they must be able to ship out to boot camp by the end of June.

"It's a very competitive job market this year. We're offering these bonuses because we want to remain competitive," said Cmdr. David Benham, spokesman for Navy Recruiting Command.

Higher bonuses up to \$50,000 could be available for certain jobs such as some on submarines and some in the information

technology fields, according to the Navy. Recruits already scheduled for basic training between July and September can receive the \$25,000 bonus as well, if they are willing to move their ship out date to before the end of June.

The military services are now competing in a post-pandemic job market in which the unemployment rate continues to decline, leaving employers fighting for workers. The unemployment rate in March dropped to 3.6 percent, near the 3.5 percent it was in February 2020 before the coronavirus pandemic began, according to the Labor Department.

The duration of this offer hinges on the budget, Benham


said. He didn't say how much money is available, but once it runs out, the bonuses will no longer be offered.

"The sooner they apply, the more likely it is that they will be able to take advantage of this unprecedented bonus structure," he said.

Former service members - either from the Navy or other service branches - re-enlisting for active duty in the Navy at pay grades E-4 or below, and who meet specific bonus eligibility and didn't receive a bonus in their first enlistment also qualify for the \$25,000 bonus, the Navy said.

Navy wants your input about environmental encroachments along Miramar pipeline

SAN DIEGO - The Navy prepared a Draft Environmental Assessment to evaluate the potential environmental impacts associated with the realignment of two segments of the Navy's existing Miramar fuel pipeline in the Clairemont Mesa area.

As part of the plan, the Navy wants to hear from you. The Navy is holding a virtual public meeting to inform the public about the proposed project and environmental impact analysis, as well as obtain public comments.

the project, e-mail NAVFAC_SW_MiramarPipeline@navy. mil. The virtual public meeting will be held April 27 from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Under the plan, the Navy would realign two existing underground pipeline segments, totaling approximately 3,400 feet, to address two major areas of the pipeline easement that have been encroached upon, making it challenging for the Navy to inspect, maintain, and repair affecting operations. The Navy encourages your participation in the environmental review process.

Although current fueling operations don't pose a risk to public or environmental safety, the proposed realignment is needed to provide enhanced access for regular inspection, routine maintenance, and emergency response. Realigning the pipeline would ensure its safe and long-term use and allow the Navy to maintain military readiness.

The Miramar Pipeline was built in 1954 and is a Navyowned and operated 8-inch fuel pipeline extending approximately 17 miles between Naval Base Point Loma and Marine Corps Air Station Miramar. The pipeline transports fuel for Navy and Marine Corps ships and aircraft and is critical for supporting the operational missions of the Navy's Pacific Fleet and the Department of Homeland Security.

Action is needed because civilian development has encroached upon Navy easements, thereby diminishing the Navy's ability to access and maintain the pipeline. Proposed action would address major encroachments at High Tech High and

the Cannington Drive areas by constructing new underground pipeline segments within the City of San Diego right-of-way, away and out from under school, church, and residential properties (see figures). The existing see **Pipeline**, page 8



Pendleton's Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program provides support for survivors

Marines are known to carry the load of physical and mental hardships of service with the help of their brothers and sisters around them. Unfortunately, Marines may have to look for a higher form of support if they have become a victim of sexual assault. To fight back and support the warfighter, the Marine Corps provides services with the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program.

The SAPR program's various services has allowed the Marine Corps to offer service members and their family members the ability to report a sexual assault and address any negative consequences that come as a result.

"We're here to support victims whenever they're ready to report a sexual assault," said Heather Guerrero, the regional sexual assault response coordinator for Marine Corps Installations West. "Our program is going to be there 24-hours, seven days a week, 365 days of the year."

The SAPR program's victim advocates understand that sexual assault is a hard subject to disclose and they want it to be known that a victim can contact an advocate and ask for information without filing a report.

"It's important to a victim who may not want to let everyone know what happened, so having that confidentiality is crucial," said Guerrero.

Survivors of sexual assault have the option of making their report either unrestricted or restricted. Confidentiality is held as a high priority in the SAPR program. Victims, whether they are military or civilian, have the opportunity to speak to a victim advocate and disclose their assault as well as any additional information when reaching out about a filing a report.

"When a victim files an unrestricted report, the victim's commander will be notified by the sexual assault response coordinator," said Guerrero. "Law enforcement will be notified and victims will be supported throughout the process."

If a survivor decides they want medical treatment, an advocate can not only refer them, but they can also accompany that individual to a forensic exam or other medical appointments related to the sexual assault. SAPR victim advocates can provide resources to survivors. Some of these resources are counseling at the Community Counseling Center, referrals to Victims Legal Counsel, providing them the DoD Safe Helpline informa-



tion, or giving them options to seek services off the military installation.

The Marine Corps' SAPR program has recently made changes to restricted reporting, victims are now eligible to file a restricted report as long as they did not personally report the incident to law enforcement and the report was not previously unrestricted. According to Guerrero, reports can be restricted even if it was disclosed to a commander or personnel in a survivor's chain of command, or if there is an ongoing investigation made by a third party report.

The SAPR program has also expanded eligibility for Catch a Serial Offender, also known as the CATCH program. This program gives victims an opportunity to anonymously submit suspect information to help identify serial offenders. Previously, it was only available to survivors who filed restricted reports but is now open to victims with unrestricted reports when the identity of the suspected offender has not been provided to NCIS. Guerrero states that CATCH gathers information into a database to see if the subject's

name is involved in any other investigations.

The DoD Safe Helpline is available day and night and is ready to provide all types of support, resources, and guidance to anyone that reached out. DoD Safe Helpline is a secure, confidential, and anonymous crisis support service specially designed for members of the DoD community affected by sexual assault.

"The SAPR program being publicized is giving victims the opportunity to finally share their stories in a confidential setting," said Guerrero. "We want there to be a general awareness on who we are and what we do so that no service member has to go through this alone."

Marines and their families should be able to work and live in a safe environment where they feel comfortable and are willing to speak out if something is wrong.

If an individual is a witness or was involved with a sexual assault, please contact 760-500-1707 to speak with a SAPR victim advocate or reach out to a uniformed SAPR victim advocate.

Former Camp Pendleton Marine sentenced to 28 years for molesting child

Former Marine sergeant Michael Hamby Jr., 30, was sentenced April 4 under a plea deal in U.S. District Court for the Southern District of California that also requires 20 years of supervised release for sexually assaulting a child in October 2016.

Hamby, who had been stationed at bases in Okinawa and California, pleaded guilty to enticement of a minor, which carries a maximum sentence of I life in prison.

"The record reflects Hamby also advertised the child as available to others and expressed an intent to engage in sexual games with two other children, ages 4 and 8," the news release said.

Hamby pleaded guilty in May 2021 in exchange for a sentence of no less than 20 years and no more than 29.

A co-defendant in the case, Elijah Alexander Vazquez, was scheduled to be sentenced before the same judge.

Hamby's pre-sentencing memorandum, which provides details of the crime to which he

confessed, remained sealed as of last Tuesday.

A brief sentencing memorandum filed in federal court April 4 described Hamby as "a man with two different identities."

"To the public and members of his own family, he was a husband and a step-father who honorably served his country as a Marine," the memorandum states

Hamby joined the Marine Corps in 2009 at age 18, according to court documents.

"He was a beloved son and brother. Upon completing his first enlistment in 2013 with an honorable discharge, he reenlisted," the memo states.

In stark contrast was his "predatory dark side," the memo states.

"He is someone who handcuffed and sodomized a [3-yearold] child," the memo states. "He is someone who advertised that this child was available for others to enjoy sexually with him."

Hamby admitted that while stationed at Camp Pendleton

in October 2016 he engaged in sexual acts with the child, the DOJ news release said.

Hamby transferred to Camp Hansen on Okinawa the following year, where the Naval Criminal Investigative Service began investigating him.

Hamby was arrested in Okinawa on March 4, 2017, after an NCIS undercover agent responded to a posting the Marine had placed on craigslist. com with the title "young girls, incest, taboo," according to a report by the San Diego Union Tribune in September 2017.

The newspaper's report was based on a search warrant affidavit filed in San Diego federal court that was used by agents to gain access to Hamby's laptop.

The female agent presented herself to Hamby as a mother with children ages 4 and 8, and Hamby sought to meet her for a sexual encounter with the children, the newspaper reported.

Hamby was held in the Camp Hansen brig from March 2017 to February 2019, according to court documents. He was indicted by a grand jury in May 2019.

Navy SEAL: 'More than just a job'

CORONADO - The sun is still below the horizon as the ocean breeze blows on a chilly winter morning in San Diego, where the latest group of Navy Sea, Air and Land (SEAL) and Special Warfare Combatant-Craft Crewman (SWCC) hopefuls hits the soft sand for some morning physical training. Overseeing this training is an experienced instructor, alternately observing and motivating the class to stay focused.

"Listen up! Eat, sleep and train. That's all you're getting paid for!"

These are the three things Chief Petty Officer Joan Jennings, an instructor at Naval Special Warfare's Basic Training Command (BTC), wants candidates thinking about as they start their day. It's an important lesson she knows from years of special warfare assessment and selection: keep your goals in the now - and make them simple. This is how candidates travel the long, arduous road to join the Navy's elite commando force. Humility helps.


"When you get down to the basics, you joined to serve your country."

BTC's instructor cadre has a broad range of experience, talents and backgrounds. Many, like Jennings, have deployed to combat zones.

"I was embedded with Army infantry prior to women being allowed in combat zones," she said, reflecting on her time as a Navy second class petty officer deployed in a combat camera role to Bagdad in 2008. "There were moments when I realized I was the only female in the FOB (forward operating base), but I didn't think of myself as some sort of trailblazer. The whole time I was there, the idea of me being a girl never really crossed my mind because we were all there to do a job, to complete the mission. I wanted to be in it and document the fight.

The mission of the instructor cadre seems simple: assess and select the next generation of Naval Special Warfare (NSW) operators to go downrange. But it takes a lot of hard work and professional requirements to earn the title of instructor at one of the Navy's most prestigious training commands, and BTC needs more than just a qualified staff – proven leaders are critical to the success of the mission.

"As a Chief and an instructor, I'm able to mentor not just SEAL and SWCC candidates, not just men or women who want to be special operators



Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Erika Neal spent five years deploying and working in support of multiple SEAL teams on the Mobile Communications Team before successfully interviewing for an instructor position at BTC. But that was just the beginning.

"I've always held the mindset that says, 'you have to earn your spot'," said Neal. In anticipation of joining BTC, she participated in a familiarization program to prepare her for the challenges of being an instructor. "I ran the beach with a boat on my head, I carried the log, swam the laps – to be a part of the team, a part of the community. We're expected to shoulder our share of the weight."

Now she serves as an instructor for the Basic Crewman Training course, helping candidates learn the critical skillsets of the SWCC community, the Navy's elite maritime mobility operators. She finds working as part of a professional cadre with different values and perspectives to be rewarding.

"It's actually really cool how different we all are, because I think that with this little group that we have, it's important that we all balance each other out," Neal said. "When we're going over ideas regarding training, we're not all coming up with the same thing. Our individual personalities help us to work interdependently."

The women of NSW share a deep sense of camaraderie as they work to deliver on mission.

"This is something I want to do. The idea of supporting women in special operations spoke to me," said Lt. Cmdr. Erica Young, force integration officer for Naval Special Warfare Command. "You see, I didn't want to simply have a job, but a career where I could build upon skill sets – where what I'm doing is rewarding and meaningful, and I'm giving back. That's

important to me, and I knew I could have that here."

Young believes the tough daily regimen of training for the next generation of warriors is worth it not only for candidates, but for the women who have earned the title of instructor.

"It's important to have these women here, regardless of whether there's a female candidate coming through or not," she said. "Because it's changing the outlook and mindset of the men, they're seeing these women get the same respect as the other male instructors, even though they don't have a SEAL or SWCC pin."

Still, the focus remains on the candidates. Jennings said that what she concentrates on today, more than 20 years after she joined the Navy, has not changed all that much from the basics she tries to instill in the candidates today. "The people we train, both men and women, they're so young and hungry. And no matter what job they pick, they're thinking selflessly, and they're committing to something bigger than themselves. We're doing something we're passionate about. And you have to be passionate about this - otherwise it's just a job."

Naval Special Warfare Center, located on Naval Amphibious Base Coronado, provides initial assessment and selection and subsequent advanced training to the Sailors who make up the Navy's SEAL and Special Boat communities, a key asset of NSW. The NSW mission is to provide maritime special operations forces to conduct full-spectrum operations, unilaterally or with partners, to support national objectives. Navy recruiter uses golf to build strong veterans community

LOS ANGELES - The crowd started arriving at dawn as the morning dew was still fresh on the grass. A line the length of a football field began to form at the check-in booth. Hot coffee was being served to those that were waiting in line. Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Gary Medell's vision had come to

"I didn't know how to golf, so my buddy and I taught one another how to golf," said Medell, an Navy Talent Acquisition Pacific recruiter. Medell started 42MM to teach local veterans the game of golf and even provides golf equipment for those who can't af-

"During the COVID-19 shutdown a lot of activities were taken away from us," said Medell. "Golf was one of the very few physical actives that I was still able to do and stay safe while being outside. My mental health was not in the best shape during the pandemic and golf really helped me cope with life.

"I found that many of my brothers in arms were not handling the lockdown well either, and I became concerned. My golfing buddies and I would invite our veteran friends out to golf, and we noticed that their attitudes were better."

At the starting point of the tournament, there was coffee and food for the entire group. The coffee was provided by a veteran owned and operated company. All 18 holes were sponsored

that lend help to veterans. The 2nd Battalion, 23rd Marine regiment supplied crew serve weapons and humvees for display. Music was loud and spirits were high. The scene was set for a great event. The tournament opened with a speech from Medell and his co-founders

In Medell's speech, he expressed his grat-

itude to all who attended and emphasized the strong connection that they all shared because of their military service. Next, the national anthem was performed by a former Marine, which was followed by cheers and applause. Golfers quickly jumped into their golf carts and zoomed off to their starting positions and the tournament was underway.

New, expanded childbirth and breastfeeding TRICARE benefits for expecting parents

FALLS CHURCH, Va. – Are you an expecting parent? Are you thinking of having a child? TRICARE is now providing more options to those who are planning to expand their family. As of Jan. 1. TRICARE added new childbirth and breastfeeding benefits under the Childbirth and Breastfeeding Support Demonstration (CBSD) CBSD is for those enrolled in TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select in the U.S. under one of the TRICARE regional contractors.

As part of this five-year study, TRICARE covers the services of three new types of TRICAREauthorized providers:

- Certified labor doulas
- Certified lactation consultants
- · Certified lactation counselors

"With the CBSD, we're evaluating the cost, quality of care, administrative feasibility, and the impact on birthing parents and infants of using trained, non-medical professionals as extra maternal health providers," said Erica Ferron, management and program analyst with the TRICARE Health Plan. "At the end of the study, TRI-CARE will review the findings and then decide whether or not to make this coverage permanent."

CARE Prime and TRICARE Select enrollees. And you must use civilian providers. This means the CBSD isn't available at military hospitals and clinics. It's also not available if you have coverage through:

- US Family Health Plan
- TRICARE For Life
- Continued Health Care Benefit Program

You don't need referrals to use network providers. If you have TRICARE Prime, you'll need a referral from your primary care manager to see a non-network provider. Without a referral, you may have point-of-service charges.

What are these new services? How can you qualify? The answers are below.

Certified Labor Doulas

TRICARE will cover up to six visits by certified labor doulas, either before or after you give birth. You also get one doula visit for the length of your delivery. These doulas are trained professionals who provide non-medical support for birthing parents.

Lactation Consultants and Lactation Counselors

As outlined in the TRICARE Maternity Care Brochure, TRI-CARE covers breastfeeding counseling, as well as breast pumps and supplies. With the CBSD, TRICARE is expanding that coverage. There are many lactation consultants and counselors who are highly trained, but not fully licensed medical providers. Expanding coverage to these providers will help you have more access to qualified lactation experts.

The CBSD also adds coverage for group breastfeeding counseling. These sessions count toward the six total allowed outpatient counseling sessions vou have per birth event.

To qualify for this extra coverage, you must:

• Be at least 27 weeks pregnant

• Use a civilian provider covered by the TRICARE regional con-

How can you enroll in the CBSD? If you're eligible, you're automatically enrolled when you submit a claim covered under the CBSD. You can also check with your TRICARE regional contractor to see if you qualify. If you need help finding a provider, talk to your regional contractor.
